# Snapshot of toy libraries in Australia







A toy library enables families to borrow a large variety of educational toys, games, and puzzles in a process similar to that of a book library. These toys suit children from birth to primary school and beyond.

Toy Libraries Australia's members have a specific focus on promoting the educational value of play for younger children, encouraging positive adult/child interactions through play, and creating strong community connections in a setting that encourages the sustainable use of resources.

Our member toy libraries operate in a variety of formats and settings, including councils-run toy libraries and toy libraries run by larger early years providers. However, most toy libraries are still small community organisations run by dedicated volunteers to provide a loved service to generations of families in their community.

We welcome the increasing investment in toy libraries made by both the Australian and Victorian governments, although the majority of funding for toy libraries still comes from membership fees and the fundraising efforts of volunteers.



# Community volunteer partnerships

Northam Toy Library developed a community partnership with St Joseph's School's special needs program. After training by toy library volunteers, two students, Cooper and Santi, and their teachers Caroline and Sally, took on the running of one toy library session each week. To grow a healthy and sustainable partnership required champions and vision from both organisations.

This partnership will help Northam Toy Library grow as an inclusive organisation and help the sustainable running of the toy library. For the students at St Joseph's School, the toy library volunteering represents a pathway for special needs students to attain important retail and management experience to support their in-school learning, and a means to meaningfully connect with and contribute to their local community.

The toy library community takes inspiration from Northam and other toy libraries with similar partnerships. This community volunteer partnership model can assist many to run a sustainable toy library.





# \$1.3m in grants have supported toy libraries in the 12 months

- \$47,500 to support children with developmental delay, ADHD and Autism (opening soon)





# Tuart Forest Toy Library

### From little things, fun things grow



**Friends** through the toy library community, Tuart Forest founding Co-Presidents, Kate Pikor and CJ Aston saw a need for a toy library in their local community. They had a **dream**, a whole lot of **passion**, the **vision** and **supports** to turn that dream into a thriving toy library.

By the time the doors of the toy library were first opened in March 2023 they had gathered a **team of people** around them, a cheer squad full of **supporters**, secured a **premises**, sourced **funding** to have the start up equipment needed and developed the necessary policies and **procedures** so everyone involved in the toy library knows how it operates. Funding included a New Toy Library grant from the Australian Government Department of Social Services managed by TLA.

The toy library membership quickly grew, and with the planning and partnership development that had already been established the toy library was able to support the quickly growing demand. The committee were well established members of the Australian toy library community, often both seeking and sharing advice with others running toy libraries across the country and state.

CJ reflects that it is more than their wonderfully curated collection of toys and games that makes a difference "We focused on our culture within the library not the numbers so everyone is truly part of the library, involving people however we can."







#### **Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan**

November 2023 – December 2024



Toy Libraries Australia is proud to have its *Reflect* Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) endorsed by Reconciliation Australia.

Key actions in our RAP include:

- Updating our Child Safe policy, Code of Conduct and position descriptions to outline the expectations of staff and volunteers to create a culturally safe environment
- Providing formal cultural learning training for staff and members run by an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander advisor
- Developing, implementing and communicating a cultural protocol document, including protocols for Welcome to Country and Acknowledgement of Country
- Raising awareness of National Reconciliation Week and NAIDOC Week
- Identifying all known Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander toy manufacturers and retailers, adding them to Toy Community, and developing a purchasing policy


#### CHILDREN'S JOURNEY

Toy Well establishes a small free toy lending service in school-based community hubs, with a particular focus on migrants, refugees and families experiencing hardship.

2023 was a big year for the Toy Well Program, with the opening of eight new Toy Well toy libraries including the expansion into Adelaide and Brisbane. There are now 14 Toy Wells providing families with access to high-quality toys that support children in their developmental journey.

Two additional regional coordinators were employed to support the hub leaders and volunteers in the new Adelaide and Brisbane based Toy Wells
The first Toy Well census was conducted with generally positive responses on the benefits that Toy Well provided. Notably 100% of hub leaders would recommend having a Toy Well toy library at the Hub and since joining the toy library parents reported that they play more with their kids.

#### **Toy Well grant successes**

- Hume City Council, Partnership Grant of \$30,000 to for regional coordinator costs to open 6 new Toy Wells in Hume council over 3 years.
- Department of Education Victoria, New Toy Library Grant of \$40,000 to support the creation of four new toy libraries
- Five Department of Education Victoria, Existing Toy Library Grants (\$3,000 each) to purchase new toys and shelving




### With diverse member needs, a diverse approach to support is required.

Alongside this we are always looking to make sure **practical knowledge** and **skills** on how to build and grow a sustainable, inclusive toy library are shared.











Supports are offered through a variety of means available to all member toy libraries:

- Knowledge base: online, tipsheets and guiding documents, available any time, any where
- Supportive online community: members continue to connect & provide peers support through our growing national & state based online discussion groups.
- Face to face training: state-based training & toy library tours are a great way for people to connect and learn, building friendships through a shared passion.
- Online live training: making training accessible to members no matter where they are based or their current circumstances, if they have an internet connection members can join our Bite Sized learning or In-Focus training sessions live or where possible view the recording on 'catch-up'.
- Individual support: Member Development Officers work with individual toy libraries to understand their current needs & assist to map a path forward.
